Developments in loan and deposit markets in August 2022

Loans market


In August 2022, new loans extended by banks totaled MDL 3,892.8 million, decreasing by 3.3% compared to August 2021.

The structure of loans granted (Chart 1) in the reporting month evolved as follows:

- 55.1% represents loans extended in domestic currency, which totaled MDL 2,144.9 million (+11.0% compared to the previous month and -23.4% compared to August 2021);
- 42.5% represents loans extended in foreign currency, which, recalculated in MDL, totaled MDL 1,655.3 million (+2.5% compared to the previous month and +38.1% compared to August 2021);
- = 2.4% represents foreign-currency-linked² loans, which amounted to MDL 92.6 million (+4.1% compared to the previous month and 3.3 times more compared to August 2021).

Dynamics of new loans extended, million MDL (upper chart) and the annual growth rate of new loans extended by banks, % (lower chart)



In terms of maturity (Chart 2), loans with maturity ranging from 2 to 5 years recorded the highest demand, with a share of 56.9%. The share of businesses' loans with this term constituted 45.5% in the total amount of extended loans.


New loans extended by maturity and their structure, %



Domestic currency loans (Chart 3) were mainly represented by loans extended to non-financial commercial companies (62.0%) and to individuals (29.5%). Within loans to non-financial commercial companies, loans to trade dominated (47.5%).

Foreign currency loans were mainly requested by non-financial commercial companies (85.7%), and the largest share (51.9%) belongs to trade.

The average nominal interest rate on new loans extended in domestic currency constituted 13.16%, on loans in foreign currency - 4.31%, and on foreign-currency-linked loans - 4.55%.


Compared to the previous month, the average rate evolved as follows (Chart 4):

- on domestic currency loans it increased by 0.37 percentage points (p.p.). Businesses received their loans at an average rate of 12.29%, individuals performing an activity³ at a rate of 16.40%, while individuals at a rate of 14.87%;
- on foreign currency loans, it increased by 0.04 p.p. Businesses received their loans at an average rate of 4.25%, individuals performing an activity at a rate of 4.97%, and individuals at a rate of 6.62%;
- on foreign-currency-linked loans, it increased by 0.18 p.p. Businesses received their loans at an average rate of 4.19 and individuals performing an activity at a rate of 6.00% (it should be mentioned that this type of loans was not requested

in July), and individuals - at a rate of 5.13%.

Compared to the similar period of the previous year, the weighted average nominal interest rate on domestic currency loans increased by 6.38 p.p., on those in foreign currency - by 0.42 p.p., and on foreign-currency-linked loans - by 0.11 p.p.

Weighted average nominal interest rates on new loans, %



The volume of domestic currency loans extended to individuals decreased in August 2022 by 7.2%, as compared to the previous month, and totaled MDL 632.8 million (Chart 5). The average rate on these loans increased by 0.57 p.p.

From the perspective of the purpose of loans extended to individuals, consumer loans held the largest share (75.8%), and were extended at an average rate of 15.69% (+0.21 p.p. compared to the previous month and +11.12 p.p. compared to August 2021).


The average rate on mortgage loans extended in domestic currency increased by 0.88 p.p. compared to the previous month and by 5.81 p.p. compared to August 2021 and totaled 12.53%.

It should be noted, that 64.2% of total mortgage loans were extended in domestic currency. Consumer loans also were mainly extended in domestic currency (99.5% of total consumer loans).

Domestic currency loans (Chart 6) with maturity from 2 to 5 years, recording the highest demand in the reporting month, were extended at an average interest rate of 13.36% (12.02% - on businesses loans, 16.89% - on individuals performing an activity loans, and 15.62% - on individuals' loans.

The highest average rate on domestic currency loans was registered on loans with maturity from 1 to 3 months and amounted to 14.62%.


Loans in foreign currency with terms of 2 to 5 years (MDL 988.57 million, which had the highest volume in the reporting month) were extended at an average rate of 4.14% (businesses loans – 4.13% (MDL 984.26 million), individuals performing an activity loans – 4.69% (MDL 2.03 million), and individuals' loans – 7.52% (MDL 2.29 million)) (Chart 6).

Deposits market

In August 2022, the new term deposits totaled MDL 5,325.5 million, increasing 2.0 times more as compared to August 2021 (Chart 7).

The volume of new term deposits constituted:

- in domestic currency MDL 3,971.5 million (+52.1% compared to the previous month and by 2.6 times more compared to August 2021);
- in foreign currency, recalculated in MDL MDL 1,353.9 million (+41.8% compared to the previous month and +23.2% compared to August 2021).

The share of deposits attracted in domestic currency constituted 74.6%, of those in foreign currency – 25.4%.

Individuals' deposits (Chart 8) represented the largest share of total deposits – 74.4% (where 59.0% represents domestic currency deposits and 15.4% - foreign currency deposits).

New term deposits placed by maturity and their structure, %



In terms of maturity, the highest demand was recorded for deposits with terms from 6 to 12 months, which held 50.8% of total term deposits (44.0% - individuals' deposits).

The average interest rate on domestic currency term deposits constituted 11.33%, and on those in foreign currency - 0.60%.


Compared to the previous month, the average rate evolved as follows:

- on new term domestic currency deposits it increased by 1.12 p.p. Businesses placed their deposits at an average rate of 4.83%, individuals performing an activity– at an average rate of 8.41%, while individuals at an average rate of 13.05%;
- on new term deposits in foreign currency, it increased by 0.16 p.p. Businesses placed their deposits at an average rate of 0.51%, while individuals at a rate of 0.66%. Individuals performing an activity did not place any foreign currency deposits.

Compared to August 2021, the average interest rate on domestic currency deposits increased by 8.20 p.p., but that on foreign currency deposits - by 0.16 p.p. (Chart 9).

Domestic currency deposits with maturity from 6 to 12 months, holding the highest share (51.8% of total deposits in domestic currency), were attracted at an average interest rate of 12.10% (businesses' deposits were attracted at an average rate of 5.54%, while individuals' deposits – at a rate of 12.5%) (Chart 10). Individuals performing an activity did not place deposits in domestic currency with terms from 6 to 12 months.

In the case of foreign currency deposits, the largest share (47.8%) is held by those with terms from 6 to 12 months, which were placed at an average interest rate of 0.51% (businesses placed their deposits at a rate of 0.37%, individuals - at a rate of 0.59%).

The highest average rate on domestic currency deposits was recorded as follows:

- on businesses' deposits with terms from 3 to 6 months (7.93%);
- on deposits of individuals performing an activity with terms from 1 to 2 years (9.00%);
- on individuals' deposits with terms from 1 to 2 years (15.83%).


The highest average rate on foreign currency deposits was recorded as follows:

- on businesses' deposits with terms from 1 to 2 years (0.95%);
- on individuals' deposits with terms from 2 to 5 years (1.24%).

Interest rate margin on domestic currency transactions constituted 1.83 p.p., while on those in foreign currency amounted to 3.71 p.p.

The interest rate margin on operations in domestic currency decreased by 0.75 p.p. compared to the previous month and by 1.82 p.p. as compared to August 2021 (Chart 11).

The interest margin on foreign currency transactions decreased by 0.12 p.p. compared to the previous month and increased by 0.26 p.p. as compared to August 2021.
