Developments in loan and deposit markets in February 2022

Loans market


In February 2022, new loans extended¹ by banks totaled MDL 4,023.8 million², recording an increase of 50.5% compared to February 2021.

The structure of loans granted (Chart 1) in the reporting month evolved as follows:

- 74.6% represent loans extended in domestic currency, which totaled MDL 3,001.9 million (+38.8% compared to the previous month and +51.5% compared to February 2021);
- 23.8% represent loans extended in foreign currency, which, recalculated in MDL, totaled MDL 959.2 million (+50.4% compared to the previous month and +46.9% compared to February 2021);
- 1.6% represent foreign-currency-linked³ loans, which amounted MDL 62.6 million (2.9 times more compared to previous month and +59.6% compared to February 2021).


Dynamics of new loans extended, million MDL (upper chart) and the annual growth rate of new loans extended by banks, % (lower chart)²

In terms of maturity (Chart 2), loans with maturity ranging from 2 to 5 years recorded the highest demand of 52.4% of total extended loans. The share of businesses' loans with this term constituted 36.1% in total amount of extended loans.

Chart 2 New loans extended by maturity and their structure, %



Domestic currency loans (Chart 3) were mainly represented by loans extended to non-financial commercial companies (55.4%) and to individuals (35.4%). Within loans to non-financial commercial companies, loans to trade dominated (32.5%).

Foreign currency loans were mainly requested by non-financial commercial companies (97.3%), and the largest share (58.9%) belongs to trade.


The average nominal interest rate on new loans extended in domestic currency constituted 9.21%, on loans in foreign currency - 4.13%, and on foreign-currency-linked loans - 3.95%.

Compared to the previous month, the average rate evolved as follows (Chart 4):

- on domestic currency loans it increased by 0.12 percentage points (p.p.). Businesses received their loans at an average rate of 8.74%, individuals performing an activity⁴ at a rate of 10.94%, while individuals at a rate of 9.78%;
- on foreign currency loans it increased by 0.08 p.p. Businesses received their loans at an average rate of 4.13%, individuals performing an activity at a rate of 4.38% and individuals at a rate of 6.98%;
- on foreign-currency-linked loans it decreased by 0.53 p.p. Businesses received their loans at an average rate of 3.47%, individuals performing an activity at a rate of 4.25%, and individuals at a rate of 4.42%.

Compared to the similar period of the previous year, the average nominal interest rate on domestic currency loans increased by 1.81 p.p., on those in foreign currency didn't change, and on those in foreign-currency-linked loans it decreased by 0.46 p.p.

Weighted average nominal interest rates on new loans, %



The volume of domestic currency loans extended to individuals increased in February 2022 by 20.1% as compared to the previous month and totaled MDL 1,061.7 million (Chart 5). The average rate on these loans remained at the level of the previous period.

From the perspective of the purpose of newly extended loans, consumer loans held the largest share (64.9%), and were extended with an average rate of 10.67% (+0.03 p.p. compared to the previous month and +5.23 p.p. compared to February 2021).


The average rate on mortgage loans decreased by 0.10 p.p. compared to the previous month and increased by 1.03 p.p. compared to February 2021.

It should be noted, that 93.9% of total mortgage loans were extended in domestic currency. Consumer loans, also, were

mainly extended in domestic currency (99.8% of total consumer loans).

Domestic currency loans (Chart 6) with maturity from 2 to 5 years, recording the highest demand, were extended at an average interest rate of 9.66% (8.73% - on businesses loans, 11.12% - on individuals performing an activity loans, and 10.69% - on individuals' loans).

The highest average rate on domestic currency loans was registered on loans with maturity from 6 to 12 months and amounted 9.69%.

Loans in foreign currency with terms of 2 to 5 years (which had the highest volume in the reporting month) were extended with an average rate of 4.23% (businesses loans – 4.22%, loans of individuals performing an activity – 4.38%, while individuals' loans – 7.55% (Chart 6)).

Deposits market

In February 2022, the new term deposits totaled MDL 2,186.8 million2, decreasing by 2.1% compared to February 2021 (Chart 7).


The volume of new term deposits constituted:

- in domestic currency MDL 1,386.7 million (-8.0% compared to the previous month and -5.1% compared to February 2021);
- in foreign currency, recalculated in MDL MDL 800.0 million (-27.3% compared to the previous month and +3.6% compared to February 2021).

The share of deposits attracted in domestic currency constituted 63.4%, of those in foreign currency – 36.6%.

Individuals' deposits (Chart 8) represented the largest share of total deposits – 71.7% (where 43.5% represent domestic currency deposits and 28.3% - foreign currency deposits).

Chart 8 $$\operatorname{New}$$ term deposits placed by maturity and their structure, $\%^2$





In terms of maturity, the highest demand was recorded for deposits with terms from 6 to 12 months, which held 40.7% of total term deposits (35.0% - individuals' deposits).

The average interest rate on domestic currency term deposits constituted 4.98%, and on those in foreign currency - 0.37%.

Weighted average rates on new term deposits, %





Compared to the previous month, the average rate evolved as follows:

- on domestic currency deposits it increased by 0.11 p.p. Businesses placed their deposits at an average rate of 3.04%, individuals performing an activity—at a rate of 3.50%, while individuals—at a rate of 5.87%;
- on new term deposits in foreign currency, it remained at the same level. Businesses placed their deposits at an average rate of 0.49%, while individuals at a rate of 0.34%. Individuals performing an activity did not placed any deposits in foreign currency.

Compared to February 2021, the average interest rate on domestic currency deposits increased by 1.17 p.p., but that on foreign currency deposits decreased by 0.23 p.p. (Chart 9).

Domestic currency deposits with maturity from 6 to 12 months, holding the highest demand (48.5% of total deposits in domestic currency), were attracted with an average interest rate of 6.14% (businesses deposits were attracted with an average rate of 3.70%, while individuals' deposits - at a rate of 6.44% (Chart 10)).

In the case of foreign currency deposits, the largest share (31.4%) is held by those with terms from 2 to 5 years, which were placed at an average interest rate of 0.40% (businesses placed their deposits at a rate of 0.28%, individuals - at a rate of 0.47%).

The highest average rate on domestic currency deposits was recorded as follows:


- on businesses' deposits with terms over 5 years (4.50%);
- on deposits of individuals performing an activity with terms from 6 to 12 months (3.50%);
- on individuals' deposits with terms from 6 to 12 months (6.44%).

The highest average rate on foreign currency deposits was recorded as follows:

- on businesses deposits with terms from 1 to 2 years (1.0%);
- on individuals' deposits with terms from 2 to 5 years (0.47%).

Interest rate margin on domestic currency transactions constituted 4.23 p.p., while on those in foreign currency amounted – 3.76 p.p.

The interest rate margin on operations in domestic currency increased by 0.01 p.p. compared to the previous month and by 0.63 p.p. compared to February 2021 (Chart 11).

The interest margin on foreign currency transactions decreased by 0.08 p.p. compared to the previous month and increased by 0.24 p.p. compared to February 2021.
